PREVIEW: 2017 ANNUAL DINNER - WHY DYLAN MATTERS

Bob Dylan rocketed to fame half a century ago with songs like *Blowin' in the Wind* and *The Times They Are a-Changin'*. He has sold more than 100 million records and has won 11 Grammy Awards. But when Dylan was awarded the Nobel Prize for Literature in December, in a ceremony he did not attend, some questioned whether he deserved to join a list that included Kipling, Shaw, Camus and Hemingway. Does a songwriter belong on this list? That is the topic – *Why Dylan Matters* - that Harvard Professor, Richard Thomas, will address as the guest speaker at our **Annual Dinner** on **June 6** at Choate. This will be a talk you won't want to miss.

This original piece, which has been donated to the Harvard Club, shows the Charles River on an autumn afternoon, seen from the south bank.

Two single sculls are about to pass beneath the Weeks Bridge. The Weld (Radcliffe) Boathouse is seen through one of the arches of the bridge, and the cupola of Eliot House is visible through trees. The artist's son, Brooks, AB '62, lived in Eliot House.

The artwork will be auctioned at the Annual Dinner with all proceeds benefiting the Harvard Club's book prize program. Brooks Childress, who grew up in Old Saybrook, was a Harvard Book Prize recipient.

April 1 marked the end of the admissions season for the Class of 2021. Harvard received over 39,000 applications for admission, 350 from southern Connecticut. 2,056 students were offered admission including **23 from our area**, thanks to the great efforts of the Club's *Schools Committee* and its small army of interviewers. The students headed to Cambridge for *Visitas*, Harvard's formal visiting program, before making their college **decisions on May 1**.

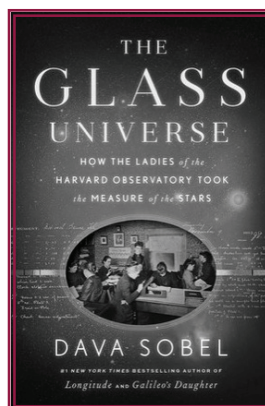

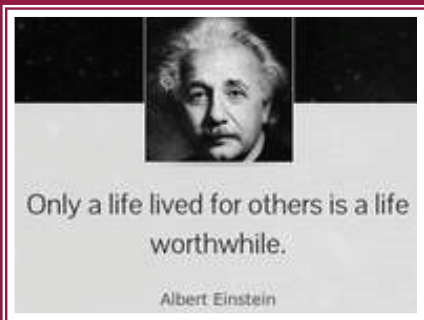
